Episcopal Minute: Week of Christian Unity

The Week of Christian Unity receives little attention these days, but it is worth noting. It begins with the feast day of one of our patron saints, Saint Peter, observing his confession that Christ is the Messiah (January 18). The week ends with an equally important observance, the Conversion of Saint Paul (January 25). We are urged to pray for Christian unity during the week inclusive of both saints' days.

Christian unity has been frayed for most of its history, sometimes with dire results. Sometimes we wonder how a belief system that preaches peace and charity could become so torn asunder. Historically, wars have been promulgated for religious reasons and we may wonder how that could happen. But we have only to look at our own times to see that religious beliefs can become emotionally charged. Praying for Christian unity may be the most we can do. On the other hand, should we be confronted with a belief system that is in contrast to our own, perhaps it would behoove us to practice some Christian charity and respect the differences. Saints Peter and Paul were not always on the same page, yet they together assured the future of the church.
