The new vestry, to be elected at the Annual Meeting on January 26, will meet the following Saturday morning, February 1, in the parlor for a half-day retreat, to elect officers and set goals for the year. The vestry members and officers will be commissioned at the February 2 Sunday service.

Episcopal Minute: Phillips Brooks

Phillips Brooks, Bishop of Massachusetts, died on this day in 1893, after a long and admirable career as a powerful preacher. As rector of Trinity Church, Boston, his sermons attracted a large following. When the church building burned down, the congregation continued to meet in bare surroundings to hear him preach. The rebuilt church was "a daring architecttural enterprise for its day" (LFF, p 54). The altar was placed in the center, symbolizing unity. I have visited this church, and I couldn't help but notice that the Romanesque design offered open sightlines to the pulpit for all attendees. He preached with warmth and vitality that greatly impressed his hearers.

His spirituality and temperament have come down to us in the words of his hymn "O Little Town of Bethlehem." The third verse states, "How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given! So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven. No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in." (Hymn 79).

Everlasting God, who implants your living Word in the minds and on the lips of all who proclaim your truth: Grant that we, like your pastor and preacher Phillips Brooks, might proclaim your Gospel in our own generation with grace and power. Amen.

When she could hold it no longer, she said that the men's shelter is a vicious den of violence and depravity ... or something to that effect. I've never seen any such thing at 2100 ... though
