## **Dispatch from Rome #4**

### ***Art, Music, and Friends***

My final week in Rome was marked by an explosion of culture and community.

**ART:** I attended two excellent exhibitions: Caravaggio, one of my favorite artists, was presented with 24 of his most famous paintings, beautifully arranged and lighted. We Caravaggio fans must otherwise run around Rome and stare at poorly lit altar pieces in widely dispersed churches. This exhibition was a chance to see many of his works under ideal conditions. The paintings were brought together from far-flung collections including five from the US. Caravaggio (died 1610) was a game changer in art history, and his works, especially the religiously themed ones, still take my breath away. The second exhibition, Barraco Globale, illustrated how Rome was a cultural crossroads in the 17th century. Interesting, but not as mind blowing as Caravaggio.

**MUSIC:** An American friend Koram plays viola in the Rome opera orchestra. In the past she has given me tickets to some great opera performances. This time she invited me and my hostess Nea to a ballet. The music was wonderful, especially "Four Last Songs" by Richard Strauss. I have sung these songs, and it never occurred to me that they could be danced!

**FRIENDS:** In addition to Koram the viola player, I have reconnected with other old friends, and new friends thanks to engagements of my hosts, who have lived in Rome off and on for 25 years. I reconnected with friends at the American Episcopal church, St. Paul's Within the Walls, where I am well

remembered for stepping in to preach and celebrate on Mother's Day 2012. Their service on May 25, Africa Day, was spectacular, including African diplomats, African women wearing beautiful color for clothing, hymns sung in Swahili and Zulu, and a lovely luncheon of African food afterwards. Wow!

**CONCLUSION:** In the end, I think my sabbatical has been mostly about relationships. One can rush about and see sights and go to museums -- I did all that during my two-month sabbatical in Rome in 2012, and I remember it vividly. My two new adventures this time, covered in Dispatches #2 (Paestum) and #3 (Assisi) were intense and moving. But the most important aspect of this sabbatical has been the people: my German American friends in northern Germany (Dispatch #1), my hosts in Rome, and old and new friends through church and other contacts. This entire sojourn has been multi-faceted, enriching, and meaningful. Thank you for allowing me this month to get away and dive into so many blessings.
