Episcopal Minute: St. Luke the storyteller

This Sunday we will hear the famous Gospel story of the Good Samaritan. We are in Lectionary Year C, when Gospel readings are usually from Luke, and his two most famous parables have been featured this year. In Lent, we heard The Return of the Prodigal Son, and now, The Good Samaritan. Both of these Sundays our guest preacher is Debbie Likins-Fowler.

Of all the Gospel writers, Luke is the easiest to understand. His writing style is clear, his narratives are exactly to the point ,and his familiar words (especially in the Nativity story) are etched on our hearts. We name this excellent writer Luke, although we aren't sure of the name, as all the Gospels are officially anonymous, but the naming (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John) helps us keep them straight, no matter what they were called in their own time. The writer of the Lukan Gospel also wrote the Book of Acts, likewise in very lucid prose. One of my clergy friends calls Luke's writing style "St. Luke the Musical," because he includes such beautiful hymns which we use as canticles (The Magnificat, the Song of Simeon, and others). Both the Gospels of Matthew and Luke are based on the sparse Gospel of Mark, each filling in Mark's narrative with extra material. Only Luke tells us these two beautiful parables.
