Episcopal Minute: Cecilia

Saint Cecilia of Rome, martyred in 230 AD, has long been revered in our tradition. She now shares her feast day, Jan. 21, with Agnes, a 12-year-old innocent child martyred in 304 AD. Both young women are held in high esteem, Agnes because of her poignant story, and Cecilia because of her association with music. Cecilia is the patron saint of singers, organ builders, musicians and poets. Many music associations bear her name. I know musicians who have named their daughters Cecilia!

We cherish music in the church for many reasons, for the beauty of musical sound and participation in our services, for music's ability to enhance our worship experience, and for music's intrinsic power to carry emotion into our hearts. Our Taize services are notable for simple chanting, which is often sung in repetition and can induce an almost trance-like effect in worshipers. A worship service without music can feel dry and austere because we are so accustomed to music.

Wednesday Book Group

The Wednesday Book Group has chosen a new book for their reading discussions: Broken Country by Clare Leslie Hall. The group meets on Wednesday mornings at 10:30 am in the parlor. Rev Barbara leads a short worship service observing a saint, and the book discussion follows at 11 a.m. Newcomers are always welcome.

The Bookshelf: Ken Follett

Ken Follett, prolific novelist and best known for his Pillars of the Earth series, has taken another step backwards chronologically and presented us with his 39th novel, Circle of Days, based on the building of Stonehenge.

The book is 688 pages long, but it is a fast read. Follett's vivid imagination is at work describing pre-history (2500 BC) in the Salisbury area of England as tribal in nature, with distinct groups of herders, farmers and woodspeople, none of whom know how to count anything, much less days. These groups are kept in check by priestesses who gather quarterly at The Memorial, a monument of shady history even then, made of large stones and wooden pillars.

In the course of the story, a miner and incipient engineer named Seft facilitates the transformation of The Monument into the Stonehenge we know today, made of stones. How they moved the stones from the north has always been a modern mystery, but it is described believably. The priestesses hold sunrise services at The Monument on both solstices and equinoxes, marking the seasons ritually. The biggest observance is called Mid-summer, the summer solstice, when the sunrise is visible between the wooden standards. Only the priestesses can keep track of the number of days between events. Hence the title, Circle of Days, is quite apt.

So, maybe it is a little far-fetched, but I enjoyed the book.
