Episcopal Minute: The Presentation of our Lord

February 2 is the feast day of The Presentation of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple. February 2 is exactly forty days after Christmas, and the Presentation commemorates when the 40-day-old infant Jesus was brought to the Temple in Jerusalem, according to St. Luke. It is a lovely feast day, one of my favorites. It comes on Monday this year, but I have chosen to move it to Sunday, February 1, so we don't miss it. February 2 is also the secular observance of Groundhog's Day, when the groundhog supposedly emerges from his underground burrow to see if the sun is shining. If he sees his shadow, he returns to his hole and we get another six weeks of winter. Given that we have all been huddling in our own nests this week, we would rather he didn't see his shadow.

This play of light and shadow has some echoes in the church. The Presentation is sometimes called Candlemas, a day to bless candles which will be used in the church for the coming year. Do you have a special candle you would like to have blessed? Bring it to church Sunday and we will do that! I will bring a purple candle that I plan to use for my home Lenten observance.

Wednesday Book Group

The Wednesday Book Group is now reading: Broken Country by Clare Leslie Hall. The group meets on Wednesday mornings at 10:30 am in the parlor. Rev Barbara leads a short worship service observing a saint, and the book discussion follows at 11 a.m. Newcomers are always welcome.

The Bookshelf: Henry VIII

I am currently reading The King's Curse by Philippa Gregory, who is a prolific writer of historical fiction. Her specialty is the Tudor dynasty. In this engaging novel, she offers an interesting variation on Henry VIII's paranoia about wanting a male heir. Modern medical assessment has looked at all the dead male babies born to Henry's first wife, Katherine of Aragon. She lost four babies at the time of their births or shortly thereafter. (Anne Boleyn lost three babies). Of those two wives, only two daughters survived, Mary and Elizabeth. Ms. Gregory writes in her author's notes that Henry may have had the rare Kell positive blood type, which can cause miscarriages, stillbirths, and infant deaths when the mother has the more common Kell negative blood type.

The author mentions that Kell positive males can also exhibit symptoms of McLeod syndrome after age forty: physical degeneration and personality changes resulting in paranoia, depression, and irrational behavior. This explains a lot!

The novel also explains in great detail that the Tudors were actually usurpers of the English throne. (Henry VII grabbed the crown from Richard III, a Plantagenet, before he killed him in 1485). The heroine of the novel, Margaret Pole, was likewise a Plantagenet, a very prolific family. Lots of Plantagenets, and only five Tudors, which is why the Tudors (especially Henry VIII) were so anxious to establish the dynasty with male heirs. Well, who knew?
